





## BORN: 1st June 1926, LA, USA DIED: 4th Aug 1962, LA, USA

Born Norma Jean Mortenson in 1926 Marilyn's mother was unable to care for her and she was placed with a foster family. Although the family wanted to adopt her, Marilyn was returned to her mother at 7 years old. Shortly after,


Gladys was hospitalised and Marilyn was sent to one of her mother's friends. Sadly that was also unstable and Marilyn spent the next 9 years shunted between family friends, foster families and orphanage.



By 16, her stark choice was return to the orphanage or get married. She chose to marry.

It lasted until 1946, by which time she was studying acting, had dyed her hair and was signed to Fox. It was short lived but led to a brief stint at Columbia, where she filmed 'Ladies of the Chorus', before signing for seven years with 20th Century Fox on the back of 'The Asphalt Jungle'. She had a series of small roles in films including 1952s 'Clash by Night' but 1953 saw her become a star with 'Niagara' and 'Gentlemen Prefer Blondes'.

But by 1955 she was tired of the limiting perception of her as a sex symbol. In order to tackle more serious roles, Monroe enrolled in New York's Actors' Studio, studying Lee Strasbourg's Method, and transformed herself in 1956 both professionally in 'Bus Stop' and personally when she surprised many by marrying playwright Arthur Miller.



The next year Monroe worked in England with Laurence Olivier on 'The Prince and the Showgirl'. Personal problems followed and it was two years until her next, and probably her most iconic, role in 'Some Like It Hot'. And it was another two years before her final film, written for her by her husband, 'The Misfits'.

She died of acute barbiturate poisoning in 1962 aged just 36. She is interred at Westwood Memorial Park.
